The museum will be presenting Thompson with a plaque commemorating all he has done for the museum, Shirley Cloud-Lane, acting executive director of the Southern Ute Cultural Center & Museum, said.

"On behalf of the museum we are honoring him for his commitment to the building of the cultural center and his donation of personal items, as well as his cultural outreach to the surrounding communities," Cloud-Lane said.

## Health Dept. enhances Pharmacy Benefit Program

The Tribal Health Department is making improvements in the Pharmacy Benefit for Members Coverage.

The Southern Ute Tribal Member Pharmacy Benefit started in 2003, to provide pharmacy access for tribal members outside of the Southern Ute Health Center service area. Now it's implementing enhancements to its program. This Pharmacy Program (provided through the Pequot Pharmacy Management Program) has grown to provide over 7,200 prescriptions filled annually at outside pharmacies for

maintenance and specialty medications. Tribal Council has considered and approved additional improvements in the Pharmacy Benefit Plan to be implemented October 1, 2014. These changes will be phased in over the next six-months, as other changes have been implemented for individuals covered by the Southern Ute Tribal Member Benefit Plan. Enhancements to the plan are:

- Expansion of the Mail Order Refill Prescriptions that can be delivered to tribal member homes.
- Improved Coordination of Benefits with the Southern Ute Tribal Health Pharmacy Program and other

third party insurances, such as Medicare, Medicaid, and employer's insurances.

- Improved Coordination of prescriptions from providers to improve services offered to members.

The Southern Ute Tribal Health Department will be mailing out additional information regarding the improvements to the Southern Ute/Pequot Pharmacy Program. Please watch for it in your mailbox soon.

## Southern Ute hosts Tri-Ute, CCIA

Round three of the Tri-Ute Council meetings took place here in Ignacio Thursday, Sept. 11 followed by a quarterly meeting with state officials and the Colorado Ute tribes Friday, Sept. 12.

TRI-UTE COUNCIL

The big topic that faced the Tri-Ute Council was tribal services. Tribal services for tribal members that reside on a sister tribe's reservation.

Services include; burial, housing and transportation just to name a few, Southern Ute Vice Chairman Melvin Baker said.

The goal is for the Tri-Ute Council to agree on a set dollar amount and a set of policies for the services that will be provided to tribal members residing on another sister tribe's reservation, Baker said.

Southern Ute Councilman Aaron Torres suggested the executive directors of each tribe be involved in setting those dollar amounts and policies since the executive offices are in charge of the administration.

The approval of a memorandum of understanding would mean aide would be provided to Ute tribal members residing on another sister tribes reservation.

"We need to help the other two Ute [tribal members] that are living here on Southern Ute [reservation]," Southern Ute Tribal Chairman, Clement J. Frost said.

Also, brought to the Tri-Ute table was an invitation from Northern Ute for fellow sister tribes to attend a Tribal Energy Summit meeting in October.

There will be representatives from state and federal levels including a representative from the White House.

"We need to be informed on the things that concern us," Northern Ute representative said.

Ute Mountain and Southern Ute both took time to update Northern Ute on recreation at Lake Nighthorse.

"We are being patient, we have had numerous meetings," Ute Mountain Vice Chairman, Juanita Plenty-holes said.

The tribes have not come to a final agreement and the lake is more than just recreation to the tribes; the area has great cultural significance as well, Baker said.

Northern Ute also provided an update on their relationship with the University of Utah.

"On Nov 22 [University of Utah] is holding a game in honor of the Utes," Northern Ute Chairman, Gordon Howell said. "The team is going to have Northern Ute patch on their



## IT'S YOUR VOTE • IT'S YOUR TRIBAL COMMUNITY

The Election Board has determined these are the dates for the upcoming 2014 General Election, according to the Constitution and the Election Code.

### SOUTHERN UTE GENERAL ELECTION Friday, November 7, 2014

#### GENERAL ELECTION RESIDENCY DEADLINE: Friday, August 8, 2014

**Constitution; Article IV, Section 5:** A candidate shall physically reside within the present exterior boundaries of the Southern Ute Reservation for at least ninety-days (90) preceding the election.

#### STATEMENT OF INTENTION DEADLINE: Monday, September 8, 2014 by 5 p.m.

**Election Code 11-3-101 (3):** A Statement of Intention shall be filed with the Election Board not less than sixty-days (60) preceding the date of the General Election.

#### ELECTION BOARD DECISION REGARDING ELIGIBILITY DEADLINE: Tuesday, September 23, 2014

**Election Code 11-3-102 (2):** Any decision of the Election Board regarding eligibility shall be made at least forty-five (45) days before the election

#### NOTICE OF ELECTION: Wednesday, October 8, 2014

**Election Code 11-4-102 (1):** Election Board shall post notices of the election within the Southern Ute Reservation at least thirty-days (30) before each election.

#### VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINE: Wednesday, October 29, 2014 by 5 p.m.

**Election Code 11-1-104 (1):** Any enrolled Southern Ute Tribal member, 18 years or over, shall register themselves to vote by this date and time to be qualified to vote at the upcoming election. The deadline to do so is seven (7) business days before the election.

#### ABSENTEE BALLOT REQUEST DEADLINE: Wednesday, October 29, 2014 by 5 p.m.

**Election Code 11-5-102 (2):** The application, letter, or telephone call requesting an absentee ballot must be received by the Election Board no later than the close of business at least seven (7) business days before the election

#### EMERGENCY BALLOT REQUEST DEADLINE: Thursday, November 6, 2014 by 5 p.m.

**Election Code 11-5-107 (1) (2) (3):** A voter may make a written request that the Election Board provide him an emergency absentee ballot if: (a) He will be confined in a hospital or at his place of residence on election day because of events arising after the deadline for absentee ballot requests; or (b) He must be absent from the reservation on election day and the reason for such absence arose after the deadline for absentee ballot requests. The written request shall contain the following: (a) the voter's name and address; (b) The nature of the emergency causing confinement or absence from the reservation; and (c) The voter's signature.

The emergency ballot request must be made before the day of the election. The Election Board shall review emergency requests on a case-by-case basis. If the Election Board determines not to grant the request, the voter shall be promptly notified of the denial and the reason. If the Election Board determines that the request should be granted, the Election Board shall deliver the emergency absentee ballot at its office during regular business hours or, in the case of a medical emergency, at the place where the voter is confined.

#### GENERAL ELECTION: Friday, November 7, 2014 – 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

**Constitution; Article IV, Section 1:** There shall be annual elections on the first Friday in November.

passion for getting the Ute story out," she said. "Everyone was really impressed with his passion with the Ute culture."

Robert Burch, museum board chairman, said Thompson has had the vision of a state-of-the-art museum for years.

"It was Bennett's idea to get this museum started," Burch said. "Bennett told me, 'we should just have someone build us a museum, so our kids and everyone will remember us.'"

Burch remembers himself and Thompson taking numerous trips across the country to visit museums as part of the planning process. Thompson was also involved in picking the architect that designed the museum.

"He was a driving force," Burch said.

Bennett was inspired by the National Museum of American Indians and aspired the Southern Utes have a quality museum, Cloud-Lane said.

"He brought his vision of the Southern Ute Museum to a realization," she said.

# What you need to know: EV D68 Virus

By now you've probably heard about the virus sweeping our country. It is called EV (enterovirus) D68 and until recently it was a fairly rare cause of illness. Not this year.

It seems to be hardest on our children, especially those less than five-years-old with chronic lung disease, such as asthma or a history of wheezing. It is spread from person to person through coughing, sneezing or touching contaminated surfaces; much like other respiratory or flu viruses.

Typical symptoms include: fever, runny nose, sneezing, coughing and body and muscle aches. Those who become very ill, especially children, have difficulty breathing, and

some have wheezing. Anyone with these symptoms – especially infants, children or teens – who are having difficulty breathing or getting worse should contact and be seen by their doctor.

There is no specific treatment or cure for respiratory illness caused by EV D68, only supportive care. For mild illness taking over the counter medications for pain and fever are acceptable.

Remember; never give aspirin, or aspirin containing products, to children.

Those with severe respiratory illness should be seen in the local emergency room, and may need to be hospitalized.

Prevention is the most powerful deterrent to illness. Wash your hands often, with soap

and water, for 20 seconds, especially after such activities as changing diapers. Avoid touching eyes, nose, mouth, kissing, hugging, sharing utensils or toys with people who are sick. Disinfect frequently touched surfaces such as doorknobs and toys.

Except in rare cases, get your flu shot starting at 6 months of age and older. And if you are an asthmatic or someone with chronic lung disease (those most at risk for serious illness) take your regular medicines and inhaler as prescribed to keep control of your illness.

So far, there have been no deaths reported due to the enterovirus D68 this season. Let us ever be vigilant, and diligent, in observing these precautions, that it may remain so.



"It's for our kids," Northern Ute Councilman Phillip Chimburus said.

Cameron Weaver, Sunshine Cloud Smith Youth Advisory councilmember, sat in on the Tri-Ute meeting representing the Southern Ute youth.

Weaver got a chance to listen in on the issues facing the sister tribes.

### CCIA

Southern Ute and Ute Mountain tribal officials met in Ignacio for their third quarterly meeting this year.

Southern Ute updated state officials about the Tribe putting on a disability awareness campaign for the organization.

"It will focus on teaching employees that people are people first, and the

disability comes second," Baker said.

The training will be provided to those departments that deal directly with the tribal membership, he said.

Education was also a big topic amongst at the Colorado Commission of Indian Affairs meeting.

Superintendent of the Ignacio School District, Rocco Fuschetto, updated the state officials on the new schools being built and how important it is to have a good relationship with the Tribe.

"Next month me and [Southern Ute Education Director] La Titia Taylor, will be attending the National Rural Education Association Conference in San Antonio to give a presentation on how the Tribe and school district work together successfully," Fuschetto said.

Ute Mountain also focused on youth and education.

"We want the Ute language to be taught at the Montezuma schools; they provide Navajo, but not

Ute," Council lady Priscilla Blackhawk-Rentz.

Superintendent of Montezuma-Cortez School District, Alex Carter agreed with Blackhawk-Rentz, noting that Montezuma County is the biggest server to Native students in the state with 33 percent of students being Native American.

The Health and Wellness Committee of CCIA is also reaching out to tribal youth. The committee is developing a paid internship program and is looking for Southern Ute and Ute Mountain youth that would be interested in interning for the committee stationed in Denver.

A representative from College in Colorado presented another opportunity for tribal youth.



# Pirates sail, IHS' Homecoming in tow

The chorus of a Lynyrd Skynyrd song ends "Double, double! T-R-O-U-B-L-E."

And Friday, Sept. 12, trouble or disaster seemingly kept coming Ignacio's way in pairs.

If it wasn't Pagosa Springs' senior defensive-line duo of Alonso Hernandez and Tyler Manzanares, it was the Pirates' backfield 1-2 punch of seniors J.C. Parsons and Caden Henderson. Or if it wasn't senior pass-rushers David McRee and Lamont Smith, it was senior quarterback Marcos Quezada – dually capable of not only carrying or tossing the ball, but also kicking (3-of-4 point-after tries) it.

And if it wasn't enough that the Bobcat's lost two running backs during the 40-8 drubbing, two PSHS non-RB's even managed touchdowns by smothering IHS-forced fumbles in the end zone.

"We pushed it and gave it 100 percent – never gave up, even when it got a little down on us," said McRee, whose unexpected score from two yards out with 5:33 left before halftime proved to be the game-winner.

"We've just got to keep going; that's been our goal this year ... never give up and don't quit."

In hindsight it was only fitting the Bobcats' hard-luck Homecoming 2014 game would end with two – Parsons and freshman Isaiah Griego – Pirates sacking senior QB Adison Jones and snuffing out Ignacio's best drive since a swift 3-play, 85-yard surge capped by an 84-yard Jones-to-Wyatt Hayes connection with 3:50 left in the second quarter.

Answering McRee's good

fortune, Jones then threw to junior tight end Nick Herrera for the ensuing two-point conversion, keeping the non-conference contest close at 14-8 and IHS Field's atmosphere energetic for the revelation during intermission of the weeklong festivities' Royalty.

But seldom letting slip a full smile, King honoree and senior lineman Alex Lopez sufficiently showed the tension of the tougher task.

Dictated by defense, the first quarter had ended scoreless as both Pagosa Springs (1-2, 0-0 2A Western Slope – South) and Ignacio forced each other once to relinquish the ball on downs – Ignacio's turnover hurting far worse after a 15-play, 7:09 grinder that gained just 39 yards to the

PSHS 35 – and once to punt it after three-and-out series.

Hayes, who finished with an unofficial 100 yards receiving on five grabs, would boot the ball away six times in all, and was also dropped for a three-yard loss on an attempted fake late in the third with IHS trailing 20-8 after a two-yard Henderson TD.

Three plays and 37 seconds after foiling the Bobcats' trickery, Manzanares then fell upon a second-down Parsons fumble with 1:12 left in the frame for his sudden one-yard, six-point-er. Quezada then tacked on the PAT for adequate breathing room – at last – up on the scoreboard.


com Preseason [released August 11th] 2014 poll.

junior Kaitlyn Rutherford went down with a wracked ankle following an unintended landing upon the foot of Ignacio junior Chrystianne Valdez, built up a lead as great as nine in an eventual 25-19 win, and as great as ten (with Rutherford taped up and back on the court) in taking Game 2 25-17.

Both visiting squads faced Ignacio's best overall efforts in the teams' respective Game 3's. The Lady Cats, motivated by three consecutive Seibel aces pressing Lang into a timeout with the score even at 16, took late leads of 18-17 and 19-18 before four consecutive IHS errors and a Nicole Hess ace gave MHS a four-point lead; they would hang on to win by the same margin, 25-21.

Sophomore Kaylee Rose led the Jays with eight kills, and senior Courtney Colyer had six to go with 14 digs (senior libero Jessica Willburn topped that category with 17).

"Consistency is key – whether it's a power serve



New Tribal Codes Coming Soon

Starting October 1, the Tribe will have two new laws on the books. One law, the Administrative Appeals and Hearings Office Code, establishes a new non-judicial body to oversee appeals and conduct hearings, and the other law, the Workers' Compensation Code, establishes a workers compensation system to govern employees' job-related injuries.

Under the Administrative Appeals and Hearings Office Code, anyone who has a hearing or appeal under certain tribal codes and policies will now work with the new Administrative Appeals and Hearings Office, which is a separate independent body that replaces the forums that currently decide appeals under codes such as the Traffic Code, the Casino Board of Review Process, the Permanent Fund Grievance and Appeal Process, the Debt Collection Code, and the Tribal Member Health Benefit Plan.

In the past, appeals under

these codes were decided by Tribal Council or ad hoc hearing bodies comprised of tribal employees. The rationale for the new code was to establish a consistent and more efficient process for hearings. With the new system, administrative appeals will be handled by a single, centralized office, headed by a professional with the experience and expertise necessary to conduct hearings with consistency. Because the office would handle all such disputes, the office would be able to execute hearing procedures with familiarity and confidence. Appeals of the Hearing Officer's decision would go to the Tribal Court.

The second new code governs the workers compensation process for tribal employees. It establishes a process and rules for administering and paying workers' compensation claims against the Tribe.

The Tribe provides workers' compensation coverage to its employees, but because the Tribe is a federally recognized Indian tribe, it is not

subject to and does not participate in the State workers compensation system. Without a Code, claims were processed in accordance with the policies of the Tribe's third party administrator, Tribal First. The Tribe's new Workers' Compensation Code uses the same benefit levels available under the Colorado state workers compensation system as a guideline for the benefits payable to tribal employees. The code addresses when an employee is entitled to workers' compensation.

In addition, it establishes claim procedures, including deadlines for reporting injury; the statute of limitations for claim filing; timelines for administrator review; allowable benefits levels; claims management practices; when and how claims will be closed; and how disputes will be resolved.

Tribal Council is currently working on revisions and updates to other tribal codes, and the tribal membership will have an opportunity to comment on those codes before they are enacted.

### Proposed Air Quality Permits to Construct Samson Resources Jaques Compressor Station

**What is being proposed?**  
This permit action will apply to an existing facility operating on the Southern Ute Indian Reservation in Colorado.

This facility is an existing coal-bed methane gas compression facility. The facility currently holds a Federal operating permit issued by the U.S. EPA Region 8 Air Program pursuant to the Title V Operating Permit Program at 40 CFR Part 71 (Part 71). The permit contains emission limits created by the EPA. The creation of the emission limits in the Part 71 permit was a temporary, gap-filling measure for those sources operating in Indian country that did not have the ability to obtain these limits through pre-construction permitting programs, such as exists in state jurisdictions.

Upon promulgation of the Tribal Minor New Source Review Program at 40 CFR Part 49 (MNSR), implemented by the Federal government, and the approval of the Southern Ute Indian Tribe's Title V Permit to Operate Program (Part 70) implemented by the Southern Ute Indian Tribe, it is now necessary to transfer these limits to the appropriate MNSR permits before the Southern Ute Indian Tribe issues new Part 70 permits.

**Proposed Permit Requirements:**  
The Jaques Compressor Station permit proposes requirements to use air pollution controls and limit the emissions of hazardous air pollutants from dehydration systems and engines operating at the facility. The Jaques Compressor Station permit proposes requirements to use air pollution controls to limit the emissions of total hazardous air pollutants, as well as formaldehyde and benzene.

**What are the effects on air quality?**  
This action will have no adverse air quality impacts. The emissions at this existing facility will not be increasing due to this permit action. In addition, this action does not authorize the construction of any new emission sources, or emission increases from existing sources, nor does it otherwise authorize any other physical modifications to the facility or its operations.

Line markers and signs only indicate approximate locations of Red Cedar Gathering pipelines and therefore should not be relied on as precise information. As a member of the Colorado One-Call center (8-1-1), Red Cedar Gathering personnel are available (free of charge) to locate and mark exact pipeline locations in advance of any work being done and help coordinate work activities that concern our pipelines.

## EMERGENCIES

If you suspect a pipeline leak or other problem:

- Evacuate from the area immediately and keep others away. Do not attempt to correct the problem yourself.

Two fourth-quarter Henderson scores, from seven yards out with 4:29 remaining and then from 12 yards out just 20 seconds later (after a Patane interception and short return) decisively pulled the outcome from the realm of doubt.

Lopez was shaken up on the latter touchdown and had his sides examined by the training staff – not a welcome sight to running back and classmate Mike Perez, his helmet and shoulder pads long since off and rib cage heavily wrapped.

Sophomore Lorenzo Pena – Ignacio's leading rusher in the game with 24 yards on nine carries – was the next ball-carrier lost, slowly taken off on a gurney with 5:29 left in the game and his head safely immobilized after being involved in stopping a

nine-yard Quezada run down to the Bobcat 15.

With senior Blaine Mickey already inactive, losing Pena thinned IHS' backfield even further – putting Jones (13 for minus-11 rushing) even more so in the Pirates' crosshairs as time wound down.

Still, he managed 6-of-6 accuracy – making him 17-of-33 overall, unofficially – and the last 37 of his 181 yards in driving the 'Cats (0-3, 0-0 1A Southern Peaks) 38 yards to PSHS' 18 with 0:16 remaining. But after head coach Lupe Huerta called a last timeout to plan the end-zone attack, the drive – interrupted once by a McRee sack on its third play – and game ended with Jones beneath a pair of white jerseys.

12-for-83 rushing with one TD, Quezada finished just 3-of-11 passing, unofficially,

for 92 yards and an interception to IHS freshman Kruz Pardo with roughly eight minutes left in the third. Henderson finished with 57 yards and three scores on 14 carries, junior Tyler Cowan gained 65 on just 10, and Parsons totaled 43 on nine as Pagosa Springs topped the 250-yard plateau.

Herrera hung onto five passes and totaled 35 yards receiving for Ignacio, and junior Anthony Manzaneres caught three for 22, but IHS lost the ball four times on downs and also had possessions ended by halftime and the final gun.

Up next, the 'Cats travel to Montezuma-Cortez (2-1, 0-0 Western Slope – South) on Sept. 19, and then out to Walsenburg on Set. 26 to begin SPC play against John Mall.






