Upon first look, you may just see abstract lines and shapes. Perhaps you see the face of a bear, or the outline of an elk. This warrior spirit is meant to represent many faces, and has multiple layers in order to encapsulate OUR 'REZ'ILIENCE as Ute people. The 'REZ' is where Ute people learned first hand what it means to be resilient. Having our connection to the land disturbed by colonization should have broken our spirit. Being forced to send our children away for assimilation should have taken our traditions. Our way of life was no longer the same, and we changed with the times in order to survive. Yet, here we stand, piece by piece we fight; we heal; we not only survive, but we thrive. This is OUR 'REZ'ILIENCE.

These individual pieces came together to create a story of that 'REZ'ILIENCE. The blue represents water, always surrounding us, holding onto our memories. Water is our past, present, and future.

The red represents Ute people. The rocks stacked on top of the spirits head represent the seven bands of the Ute nation, united and supported by each other. The yellow represents our strength, reminding us that we are stronger together and our strength comes from the creator and is spread through each and everyone of us. The two feathers are there to represent our morning and evening prayers. The white represents the smoke from our medicines burning, thanking the creator for our lives, and the lives before us. The flower blossoms represent our healing, showcasing to us that even though trauma creates lasting impacts; those little buds are our reminder of the beauty of growth. Blended together each piece is my tribute to OUR 'REZ'ILIENCE, to our Ute nation.






Sam Burch Memorial Contest Rules:

• **Competition:** This contest is a competition in the performance and characteristics of a sensible, well-mannered, free and easy-moving ranch horse which can get a person around on the usual ranch chores, in open country rides, and over obstacles.

• **Equipment:** Any western equipment of the exhibitors choices may be used, the kind of equipment apparently necessary for the control of the animals, such as tie downs may be considered by the judge in making awards. Extra credit will not be given for expensive, fancy, or parade equipment of the animal or dress of the rider.

• **The Horse:** The horse will be judged on riding qualities of gaits (walk, trot and lopes), movement, response to the rider, manner, disposition and intelligence. Confirmation will not be judged.

• **The Exhibitor:** The Exhibitor will be judged on proper dress (Native or Western) and will remain mounted throughout the exhibition except when asked to dismount and remount and ability to control and maneuver the horse.

Weights and Weigh-Ins

- Competitors can only weigh-in during posted times.

- There is NO clothing allowance opponent for a win.

- Any individual(s) attempting to alter weight by not following

proper weigh-in procedure will be disqualified from the event.

Competition – General

- Competitors have 60 seconds to report to the table when called or will forfeit that match.

- All matches start in a strap.

- Competitors will flip a coin to determine who selects table side when both competitors want the same side.

- Nothing shall be worn on the competition hand, wrist or arm on the elbow or below during competition, nor any substance applied to the hand or wrist, except chalk. Any violation can be grounds for disqualification.

-In the event of a bleeding injury, a competitor MUST stop the bleeding to the referee's satisfaction. Use of a Band-Aid or a piece of tape the size of a Band-Aid on the wound is allowed. -Any competitor exhibiting impairment due to alcohol, drugs or otherwise, may be disqualified from competition.

-In the case of any equipment failure the referee has the authority to stop the match at any time. The match will be restarted with all fouls that occurred prior to the stop remaining in place for the restart.

-During any discrepancy, or match stoppage both competitors are to report to their specific corners and wait for the referee to call them back to the table, once the discrepancy and action is decided by the head referee. Any infraction of this rule can lead to a disqualification.

THE GRIP

- Competitors must keep one foot in contact with the floor at all times.

- Competitors must keep non-pulling hand in contact with the peg at all times.

- Competitors must follow all commands of the referee during the match.

- Referee will set competitors elbow on the elbow pad, square their shoulders, and strap their hands.

- Competitors' hands must be palm-to-palm, flat together and with no separation, to the satisfaction of the referee. Referee must be able to see competitors thumb knuckles.

- The referee will command the competitors to "Close your hands"

- Referee will make sure the competitor's wrist is straight when closing their thumbs and hands.

- The referee will give the command "READY GO" to start the match.

Fouls

A competitor receiving any 3 fouls will result in a LOSS OF A MATCH

All of the below result in a foul:

- Prior to "GO," any movement of the hand/wrist/arm, including a False Start.

- Touching any part of their body such as chin, shoulder or head to the competing hands.

- The elbow losing contact with the top of elbow pad at any time during the match.

- If one foot is not in contact with the floor during the match.

- If a competitor attempts to delay a match by not staying at the table.

- Poor sportsmanship may result in a foul. If the conduct continues it can result in removal from the event and/or forfeit of any placements and awards.

- Losing contact with the peg with non-competing hand.

- Competitors cannot drop the competing shoulder below the level of the elbow pad when in a neutral or losing position.

- The referee will enforce the above rules to ensure the most fair and sporting match. Any simultaneous fouls by both competitors will result in Stop/Restart with NO fouls.

WARNINGS – THERE ARE NO WARNINGS. (i.e. for false starts or any of the above fouls)

PIN- Competitors must touch to the pin pad any portion of the wrist to fingertips of their

- A parallel pin will occur when any portion of their opponent's wrist to fingertips breaks

the pin line RUNNING FOUL SYSTEM

IMPORTANT: NEVER STOP ARM WRESTLING UNTIL A REFEREE STOPS THE MATCH

- Fouls will be announced during the match, but DO NOT STOP ARM WRESTLING.

- If competitor "A" commits a foul then competitor "A" pins their opponent it will result in a stop/restart with the foul rolling over to the next pull.

If competitor "A" commits a foul then competitor "A" commits another foul, they continue to accumulate until 3 fouls/loss.
If competitor "A" commits a foul then competitor "B"

Southern Ute Tribal Fair Dance Contest Rules 2022

- 1. Registration, opens Friday at 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m., closes at 1:00 p.m., Saturday.
- 2. Each contestant must wear the number issued by the Committee. Display your contest number on your **left side** for the duration of the powwow.
- 3. Each contestant must register in only (1) one dance category and be responsible for participating in all grand entries, exhibition and dance contest. Once registered, **you cannot switch to another category.**
- 4. Dancers are expected to dress in **<u>full</u>** regalia for grand entry.
- 5. At any given time, the Powwow Committee may request a participation dance for any category.
- 6. All dancers are expected to be ready when called to grand entry, exhibition and contests.
- 7. When a particular dance category is divided into groups, the dancer/contestant is required to compete in their group placement. **Dancing** in the wrong group will result in no points received for that session.
- 8. Banners, crowns and other signs of royalty are not to be worn during the contest, insuring that all dancers are judged by ability rather than popularity.
- 9. The rules for judges require that no family member through marriage, blood or adoption shall judge a particular contest, which has a relative competing. **IF** this happens and is discovered by the Arena Director, Tabulators or Powwow Committee, the dancer will be disqualified for the day. We advise all dancers to assist in making sure this does not happen to them

10. No Whistle Blowing Allowed.

- 11. If any major part of the contestant's regalia falls or is dropped during the contest song, they must be disqualified voluntarily (dyed hackles are not considered a major part).
- 12. The use of **ALCOHOL OR ILLEGAL DRUGS** during the contest will result in the disqualification of the contestant from all competition.
- 13. The following individuals will not be allowed to compete in any of the contest. The Powwow Headstaff, all Powwow Committee Members and Southern Ute Royalty.
- 14. The prize money will be released to the announced contestant winner only. The winner will be required to sign for their prize money. If the winner is not present, you will forfeit your money.
- 15. Payments which are \$600.00 or more, requires reporting on a W-9 form.
- 16. Contest ties will be properly handled. (Run-off)
- 17. ALL DECISIONS OF THE POWWOW COMMITTEE ARE FINAL!!!!
- 18. LOST/OR DISPLACED NUMBERS WILL NOT BE REPLACED.

Southern Ute Tribal Fair Drum And Singing Rules 2022

- 1. Registration Opens Friday at 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m., closes 1 p.m., Saturday.
- 2. All lead singers must register their drum group and provide all singers names to be eligible for contest monies.
- 3. Lead singers **MUST** provide the Drum Rules to each drummer.
- 4. Payments which are \$600.00 or more require a W-9 form to be filled out. (please notify the committee member)
- 5. Drum groups must set up at the same location each session
- 6. All singers must be present for drum roll call. There will be a roll call 15 minutes before every grand entry.
- 7. Drum group must have a minimum of (10) ten singers.
- 8. Drum hopping will not be allowed.
- 9. Drum groups will be judged each day for originality leads, seconds, drumming, harmony, cleanliness and appropriate song.
- 10. Song lengths will be limited as follows (Drum Judge has discretion to modify)
- 11. *Intertribal -6 push- ups-; *Contest-4 push- ups-; *Grand Entry -4 push-ups.
- 12. Drum rotation will be clockwise for intertribal and counter clockwise for contest song. **EXCEPTION:** Host Drums will sing final contest song
- 13. Respect other drums no drum practice while other drums are performing.
- 14. Any singers suspected of alcohol or drug use, exhibiting inappropriate behavior will cause the drum group to be disqualified for that day.
- 15. The rules for judges require that no family member through marriage, blood or adoption shall judge the drum contest which has a relative competing. If this happens and is discovered by the Drum Judge, Arena Director, Tabulators or Powwow Committee, the Drum Group will be disqualified for that session. We advise all drum groups to assist in making sure this does not happen. (All points will be taken away)
- 16. Host Drum Groups will not be eligible to compete in the Drum Contest.
- 17. P.A. System will be provided. (Please do not bang or shake the microphone, which has been provided, or you will be held responsible for damages, per contractor.)
